

Design Leadership with 2016 AIA|DC President, Sean Stadler, AIA

The 2016 AIA | DC President, Sean Stadler, AIA wants to encourage design leadership within the community to raise the value of design in Washington, DC. Stadler defines design leadership as the way architects interact with the community, clients, and other architects. The leadership of architects is often driving decisions in a direction that benefits the community, the environment, and raises the level of the built environment.

Stadler believes that the Chapter reinforces and celebrates the critical role that architects play in the community through design excellence awards, competitions, and the Fall Design Fête. One of the newest initiatives this year was the Sarah Booth Conroy Prize for Architectural Journalism and Criticism. This prize is given to a critic who writes about architecture in the city, and helps the public be more aware of design. Kriston Capps, this year's winner, will be presenting a lecture as a part of Architecture Week discussing

The Stories Buildings Tell on April 11 at the District Architecture Center. DAC is a great place for the community and the professions to interact create a dialogue about the value of design and what is happening in the architecture of Washington, DC.

Stadler is also involved with the strong role in advocacy that the Chapter, along with DCBIA, is playing to comprehend the DCRA's permitting process. In Remembrance of Joseph Edward Wnuk, AIA (1943 - 2016)

WNUK SPURLOCK Architecture's co-founder, Joe Wnuk, passed away on March 8 after a long illness. Wnuk was a graduate of University of California at Berkeley with a Master of Architecture and Catholic University of America with Bachelor of Architecture. His extensive architectural work has included many renovation and restoration projects, particularly in areas that require review by government agencies, and with historic district designations. Wnuk was an Associate Professor in Interior Design at several local universities. He held positions as the Chair of the Interior Design Department and, eventually, Associate Dean for the School of Art and Design at Mount Vernon College, Washington, DC. Wnuk was an active member of the community and served on several non-profit Boards including the Board of the Liz Lerman Dance Exchange as Chair of its Finance Committee. He was also on the Board for the Cultural Alliance of Greater Washington and was active in its Business Volunteer for the Arts program.

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
