Selling Your Design Firm 101: The Internal Transition By Matthew J. Gaziano, Esq., Lee & McShane, PC

When a successful architect wants to retire and sell the firm, there are two common concerns related to transition of the firm:

- 1. Receiving fair financial compensation for the goodwill and other assets of the firm; and
- 2. Continuing to operate and provide employment for those who have made the firm successful.

In a series of articles, we will review the various options available to effectuate a successful transition of an architecture firm.

This first article reviews one of the most common options for transition of an architecture firm: the internal ownership transition. Architects at all stages of their career should be familiar with the internal transition – those nearer the end of their career need to be planning their transition out of the firm, while those nearer the start should understand the expectations for acquiring ownership through an internal transition.

Typically, the retiring architect sells his/her ownership stake in the firm to a licensed architect who wants to take over and lead the firm, combining a promotion with a transition to equity ownership for the purchaser. With that ownership comes the right to a percentage of the profits, i.e., the earnings after salaries and bonuses for all employees. The sale can transfer full ownership of the firm, or it may transfer partial ownership. The seller usually provides financing by taking a promissory note and receiving payments over a period of years (which come from the profits that the purchaser receives).

The internal transition often includes employment agreements for the seller. The seller often agrees to continue doing business development or to assist the purchaser develop management skills. Ideally, the seller should work long enough to ensure the transition succeeds, ensuring that the firm generates enough profits for the buyer to complete the buyout. This employment agreement usually includes a non-compete provision.

Many firms—small and large—have successfully implemented internal transitions across multiple generations. While it requires advanced planning, an internal transition can be a satisfying way for an architect to retire. Using the internal transition model is highly effective and is an option that all architects should consider, particularly when the firm has created a culture of advancement and increased responsibility among its younger architects.
